THE LABOR FORCE SURVEY IN BRIEF JULY (1998-1999)

Overview

The country's labor market improved in July 1999 compared to the same period last year, data from the Labor Force Survey (LFS) of the National Statistics Office indicate. This can be attributed mainly to the strong employment growth in agriculture, the turnaround in industry employment, particularly in manufacturing and the general improvement in the quality of work. Moreover, the national unemployment rate edged down slightly by 0.5 percentage point. However, the incidence of underemployment continued to rise during the period

Participation Rate

Labor force participation rate (LFPR) rose to 65.6 percent from 64.9 percent a year ago. Notable increases were observed among women (48.0% to 49.4%) and prime working age group 25 to 54 (76.9% to 77.7%). Overall, the country's labor force population expanded by 1.12 million to reach 31.713 million.

Employment

Employment level grew by a moderate 4.3 percent (+1.199 million) from a year ago level to 29.055 million in July 1999. The quality of employment generally improved this year as indicated below.

Employment in the agricultural, fishery and forestry sector continued to recover posting a strong 6.8 percent growth rate (+750,000) up from last year's sluggish 0.2 percent (+19,000) growth.

- For the first time, industry employment posted a turnaround (0.3%) after suffering a series of decline in 1998 and in January and April this year. This is attributed mainly to the 3.6 percent growth (+96,000) manufacturing employment. The rest of the sub-industry sectors remained on the slump: mining quarrying (-23.4%),and electricity, and water gas (-8.6%)and construction (-2.5%).
- **Employment** the service in sector grew by 3.5 percent (+434,000), about the same last year. Growth was particularly the financing strong in (-7.0% to 10.1%) and sector transportation, storage and communication (4.6% to 5.5%). But it exhibited a considerable decline in the community, social and personal services (4.8% to 1.0%).
- Persons in full-time employment (worked 40 hours and over a week) grew by 1.2 percent (+219,000) after declining by 4.1 percent (-767,000) a year ago. In contrast, part-time employment was down to 10.4 percent (+975,000) from 12.4 percent (1.042 million) last year.

- Wage and salary employment expanded 2.8 percent (+381,000), a turnaround from last year's decline of 2.0 (-276,000). percent Higher employment increments were also noted among own-account workers (+498,000) and unpaid family workers (+320,000)relative to last year.
- Employment increments were posted highest in Southern Tagalog (+147,000), Central Luzon (+117,000), Central Visayas (+114,000) and Northern Mindanao (+110,000).

Unemployment

The number of unemployed people declined (-49,000) from last year to 2.658 million in July. This figure corresponds to unemployment rate of 8.4 percent, down slightly by 0.5 percent from 1998 figure. This occurred despite the increase in participation rate by 0.7 percentage point over the period.

Unemployment rate among young workers (15 to 24 years old) which constituted nearly one-half (47.4%) of total unemployed persons was up to 18.2 percent from 17.8 percent a year ago.

- The jobless rate was down mainly among rural workers (6.5% to 5.8%) and women (9.4% to 8.5%).
- The highest unemployment rate was recorded in the National Capital Region (15.4%) followed by Central Luzon (9.3%), Southern Tagalog (8.8%) and Central Visayas (8.8%). The lowest were recorded in ARMM and Cagayan Valley (3.2% each).

Visible Underemployment

The visible underemployment rate (employed persons who worked less than 40 hours and wanting additional hours of work or job) inched up by 1.1 percentage points from 3.036 million to 3.481 million. Majority (67.6%) was employed in the rural areas (2.352 million workers).
